The College Alumni provides a platform for bringing the ex-students into the premises of the College and to utilize their expertise, knowledge and achievement in various fields of life for the welfare of the College and gives an opportunity to connect to their alma mater.

1.Goal

It also aims to bring all alumni under one umbrella to interact, connect professionally, intellectually and grow relationships with the common thread of College. AASCON is an autonomous body but has always taken a keen interest in the activities of the College. It aims at all round growth of the students that includes academics, sports, arts and culture

2.The Context

With a view to motivate students to perform better in the exams, every year AASCON is giving scholarships to the toppers of all streams and also to research students. By giving scholarships the moral of the students gets boost up and it also creates competitive spirit among the students to perform better. It also eases the financial burden of students coming from the poor and backward segment of the society.

3. The Practice

Every year the toppers of all streams from the Institute are rewarded by AASCON with the scholarship to motivate the students study hard and also boost up their moral for continuing higher studies.

4. Evidence of Success

Students are charged with competitive spirit which enhances their active participation in the academic curriculum effectively resulting in creating the positive atmosphere for carrying out their studies for the current academic session as well as for continuing higher studies. Award of scholarship acts like moral booster and also extend the financial support.

Best Practice II:

Title of the Practice - 'Life Skill Education'

1. Goal

Most of the youngsters today, because of their inquisitiveness and peer influence tend to move towards wrong sources which give them incorrect information about adolescence and sexual behaviors, leading to a disaster in congruent and perhaps lead to disaster in a long run. It is very essential to give them correct and proper information in a scientific and sensitive way so as to prevent them from going towards a wrong track.

2. The Context

Bearing in mind this situation of youth 'SEARCH' (Society for Education, Action & Research in Community Health) Gadchiroli designed a program 'TARUNYABHAN'. The content of workshop was designed by leading gynecologist **Maharashtra Bhushan Dr. Rani Bang** and associate facilitators. With this relevance Govt. Institute of Science has organized three days' workshop on **09**th **to 11**th **March, 2017** in association with Maharashtra Bhushan Dr. Rani Bang's SEARCH organization. In all total **186 participants** registered their name for taking advantage of this workshop.

3. The Practice

The following issues were discussed during these three days of workshop.

- Physical and Mental changes during adolescence.
- Differentiation between real love and infatuation.
- Reproductive organs and their development in human.
- Responsible parenthood and selection of partner.
- Menstruation: Precautions and cleanliness.
- Masturbation and Nightfall.
- Infertility
- Family planning and contraceptive measures.
- Cancer of breast and reproductive organs.
- Marriage and married life.
- Being a responsible youth

The chief speaker **Dr. Rani Bang** addressed the students and given the idea about what is real life? Present status of youth in society & Do's and Don'ts. she gave information about Adolescence, Reproductive systems of human and its working, Later on again **Dr. Rani Bang** explained the topics of Menstruation in females & their problems, Precautions and cleanliness, selection of partners and self-confidence.

The faculty of SEARCH explained and given the knowledge about various topics i.e. Pregnancy, Sex determination, Twins, Baby mother, Abortion and Irresponsible sexual behavior & its effect. Detailed information about diseases of sexual organs caused by misbehavior and married life. Valuable information about AIDS, Cancer of Breast and Reproductive organs and use of Contraceptive measures etc. was given.

4. Evidence of Success

Interactive session was held, in which the faculty of SEARCH clarified the doubts of students. During the program 15 participants expressed their positive views in favor of workshop and happily told that all the misconception now got cleared.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: In the present educational curriculum there is no specific and well defined educational programme incorporated, hence students are not properly and scientifically guided on this sensitive subject which is very important in every human beings life. Firstly nobody is willing to talk on this subject freely and secondly there are very few professionals who are willing to guide on this subject authoritatively. Even today also people hesitate to talk on this subject openly, stating that it is against our culture. However society has now realized the importance of sex education and slowly trying to overcome the cultural barrier.
